Please join us at Mirabella on Saturday March 12th. Enjoy delicious food and catch up with old and new members. During the Annual Meeting, members will have the opportunity to elect officers and convention delegates and hear from program officers and committee chairs.

Following the business meeting, we are honored to have Jessica Katz, MSW, speak to us about the Family Preservation Project (FPP), a program of the YWCA of Greater Portland.

Since 2000, the number of female inmates in Oregon has grown 86%. It is estimated that 80% of incarcerated women are mothers to children 0-18, most of whom resided with their children prior to their incarceration and will likely resume parenting roles once released. Informed by best practices, the FPP at Coffee Creek Correctional Facility has consistently provided intensive case management and wrap-around services to incarcerated mothers, their children, and the children's caregivers in the community. The program helps children and mothers keep, repair, and create healthy relationships, in order to ensure successful reentry and interrupt the cycle of intergenerational criminal justice involvement, poverty, and addiction.

Directions and Parking: Because of construction, only **limited street parking** is available. We strongly encourage you to take public transportation. The Portland Street Car North South Line (N/S) stop at SW Lowell & Bond at the South Waterfront District is one block from the Mirabella. The Orange MAX line South Waterfront/SW Moody station is about a half mile north of Mirabella.

AAUW STEM Project Progress

On Thursday, March 3, Saturday Academy, the sponsor of our STEM Project, will be holding their annual fundraiser, a luncheon at the Portland Zoo. Sue Thomas has been appointed a “table captain” for the occasion. She is seeking members to attend. There is no cost for the luncheon, but donations are encouraged. Please contact Sue soon if you plan to attend.

Barbara Miner, our leader for the STEM project, recently gave a progress report on how the classes are going at this point. Over 215 young girls have attended the classes held so far this year. We have already surpassed our stated goal of teaching 200 girls in this school year! In addition, 15 teen-aged girls have been trained and have served as teachers for the classes. Barbara has requested future grant money to expand to Hispanic groups in Hillsboro and Forest Grove.

AAUW volunteers are critically important, according to Barbara, especially when a lot of girls are signed up and there is sufficient space. The Girl Scout Headquarters building at 9620 SW Barbur Blvd. in Portland is a very good location for the classes. Among the duties our volunteer AAUW members have participated in are: giving individual girls more attention; and collecting and organizing the paperwork (pre-and post- class surveys and registration forms). We can reach more girls by having those extra helpers available.

Future dates for which we need volunteers include: Sundays, March 13, April 10 and 24; classes on those dates are all scheduled for the G.S. Headquarters building, from 1 to 4 pm. In addition, there is a class scheduled for Monday, March 14, at the Bridlemile Elementary School Library in Portland. The location is 4300 SW 47th Drive. The time for that class is 2 to 4 pm.

Public Policy Interest Group Update

Over the last few months, the Public Policy group has been studying the issue of human trafficking as it is experienced by young people in Oregon-especially young women and girls. Our general summary statement of what we have learned so far is that human trafficking, whether sexual or labor, is a huge problem in the Portland and I5 corridor area. Many of the structural and personal, causal- factors are fairly well understood by the social and legal systems, but the tools to stop trafficking are difficult if not impossible to put in place. A most recent example is the entry of gangs into the trafficking arena. It seems that gangs have realized that once your drugs are gone, they are gone, but a young woman or child prostitute is a reusable commodity.

In particular we were interested in the research presented by Professor Christopher Carey at the joint AAUW/YWCA program on human trafficking. His findings support a direct relationship between foster care and human trafficking. Specifically, CAS Research and Education shows that the relationship is as follows:

Foster care children are targeted by traffickers because of their need for love, affirmation, and protection.

Victims are trained to call sex traffickers “daddies” and themselves “wifies” – a perverted reflection of the family unit that these children are seeking. These children long for a family...even if it means being subjected to extreme violence and abuse.

We personally and as a group are overwhelmed by our recognition of the complexity of issues involved. We do, however believe there are small strides toward positive outcomes that we can make even at this early point in our work. Based on our work-to-date, the board has authorized branch support for the “The Family Stability & Kinship Care Act,” introduced by Senator Ron Wyden, D-OR, with seven co-sponsors, which gives states the option of providing certain time-limited family services, including parenting and family-skills training and counseling, to a child meeting certain criteria or the child's parents or kin caregivers. We plan to email the Senator’s office to express our support and request a meeting to learn more about this proposed bill and other efforts in this area. As a follow-up to this meeting, we anticipate further advocacy work with National AAUW on this topic.
